THOUGHTS ON EVANGELIZATION Readings: Wis 18:6-9/Heb 11:1-2, 8-19 or 11:1-2, 8-12 Lk 12:32-48 or 12:35-40

Today's gospel is a teaching on the return of the Lord and how we must be prepared to welcome him. We do not know when he will come, but we trust his Word, and we put our faith in his word. But our waiting is not to be just a passive looking out the window. We are called to serve, to share with those in need, to live our lives as intentional disciples of the Lord. WHY MAKE SACRIFICIAL GIFTS OR DONATIONS TO THE CHURCH?

Perhaps the most important outcome of Sacrificial Giving is the impact it has on the giver. If you can give your gift and not notice it, it isn't a sacrificial gift. The element of sacrifice is present when something about your life has to change in order for you to be able to give the gift. You reorder your priorities, you reconsider your values. And every time you give the gift, you are reminded of the reasons why you have chosen to give. Sacrificial Giving is one way we have of walking in the footsteps of our Lord, who sacrificed everything so that we might have life. We give up something of ourselves so that life can flourish, and future can build. When we give that way, we are changed. When giving becomes Sacrificial Giving, it focuses our attention on the true source of our security. Sacrificial Giving bears witness to the reality that God alone will make us safe. Recognizing that reality and living it out constitutes a tremendous change in our lives and we make a tremendous difference to the lives of others. Also keep in mind that no pastors would be asking donations for themselves but it's for the upkeep of our Church and for the future generations who would assemble in Christ's name in each Churches. FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...



St. Lawrence (August 10^{th)} is one of the most venerated saints among the Christian martyrs. We know very little about his life. He is one of those whose martyrdom made a deep and lasting impression on the early Church. A well-known legend has persisted from earliest times. As

deacon in Rome, Lawrence was charged with the responsibility for the material goods of the Church, and the distribution of alms to the poor. When Lawrence knew he would be arrested like the pope, he sought out the poor, widows, and orphans of Rome and gave them all the money he had on hand, selling even the sacred vessels of the altar to increase the sum. When the prefect of Rome heard of this, he imagined that the Christians must have considerable treasure. He sent for Lawrence and demanded to bring all riches. Lawrence replied that the Church was indeed rich. "I will show you a valuable part. But give me time to set everything in order and make an inventory." After three days he gathered a great number of people who were blind, lame, maimed, leprous, orphaned, and widowed persons and put them in rows. When the prefect arrived, Lawrence simply said. "These are the treasure of the Church." The prefect was so angry he told Lawrence that he would indeed have his wish to die—but it would be by inches. He had a great gridiron prepared with coals beneath it and had Lawrence's body placed on it. After the martyr had suffered the pain for a long time, the legend concludes, he made his famous cheerful remark, "It is well done. Turn me over!"

I have always found this a hard gospel. Jesus tells us that he has not come to bring peace, but rather division. At least we may see it as division, because we have such a superficial concept of peace. We think we can have peace by simply whitewashing over our differences, by simply being tolerant or trying to ignore the things that bother us. But that is not the peace of Christ. Peace comes from recognizing the Truth, working hard to work through our differences, and truly loving others in our differences. This is not easy, and we cannot do it on our own. We need the fire of the Holy Spirit to burn away those things in our lives that keep us from the Truth of Christ.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...



The Assumption of Blessed Virgin Mary (Aug. 15th) into heaven is a logical consequence of the dogma of the Immaculate Conception. Because Mary was born without original sin,

she did not suffer its consequences, among which is death. Because she was a kind of Ark of the New Covenant, carrying the Church in the person of Christ, God preserved her from sin and wanted her in His presence when her time on earth ceased. No saint has ever enjoyed such a privilege because no saint ever had the relationship with Christ that Mary enjoyed. A pious tradition says that the choirs of angels in heaven whispered in awe to each other as Mary was assumed into God's presence, "Who is this woman treated with such unique respect and honor?" Sometimes it's hard to appreciate the beauty and majesty of a massive landscape without a person to give it scale. How high is that waterfall? How tall is that mountain peak? How far is that shore? Place a person in the field of vision and suddenly the image makes more sense. God fills every scene with his majesty. He is almost too much to take in. But Mary gives God scale and perspective. She humanizes the view. Mary is always there in the foreground, showing the faithful how to approach God and render Him due honor. With Mary as our mother, the Church and her doctrines are vivified. They seem to matter more. As Louis de Montfort well quoted "To Jesus, through Mary" and may she remain as constant companion in our journey of faith. Mary, Our Mother, pray for us.

HOW IMPORTANT IS MAKING GOOD CHOICES?

Our conscience is the inner voice that helps us to know the law God has placed in our hearts. Our conscience helps us to judge the moral qualities of our own actions. It guides us to do good and avoid evil. The Holy Spirit can help us to form a good conscience. We form our conscience by studying the teachings of the Church and following the guidance of our parents and pastoral leaders. God has given every human being freedom of choice. This does not mean that we have the right to do whatever we please. We can live in true freedom if we cooperate with the Holy Spirit, who gives us the virtue of prudence. This virtue helps us to recognize what is good in every situation and to make correct choices. The Holy Spirit gives us the gifts of wisdom and understanding to help us make the right choices in life in relationship to God and others. The gift of counsel helps us to reflect on making correct choices in life. The Ten Commandments help us to make moral choices that are pleasing to God. We have the grace of the sacraments, the teachings of the Church, and the good example of saints and fellow Christians to help us make good choices.

Making moral choices involves the following steps:

- 1. Ask the Holy Spirit for help.
- 2. Think about God's law and the teachings of the Church.
- 3. Think about what will happen as a result of your choice. Ask yourself, will the consequences be pleasing to God? Will my choice hurt someone else?
- 4. Seek advice from someone you respect and remember that Jesus is with you.
- 5. Ask yourself how your choice will affect your relationships with God and others.

Making moral choices takes into consideration the object of the choice, our intention in making the choice, and the circumstances in which the choice is made. It is never right to make an evil choice in the hope of gaining something good.

Enter through the narrow gate. The narrow gate takes a little effort on our part to locate, or perhaps we need to be shown where the narrow gate is. I remember going to mass at a huge cathedral, but the daily mass was in a small chapel and you had to enter by a little side door. It took a little effort to find it, but once you knew where it was, there was no problem getting in. Similarly, in the gospel the people who are locked outside think they know Jesus and that it is enough to be let in. But we are called to more than a casual acquaintance. We are called to a deep relationship, to truly come to know Jesus, and so be transformed by his love. If we respond to Jesus' invitation to be his disciple, we will come to know him, and we will be able to find that narrow door that is open to all if we but make an effort to find it. FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...



Saint Bartholomew (Aug.24th) is one of the Twelve Apostles, mentioned sixth in the three Gospel lists. Besides being listed as an Apostle, he is not otherwise mentioned in the New Testament, at least not under the name Bartholomew: many ancient writers,

and Catholic tradition have identified Bartholomew as Nathaniel in the Gospel of John. Nathaniel was a man well-read in the Scriptures and knew what they said of the Messiah and where he would come from. This is why he is skeptical of Phillip's claim that Jesus is the Messiah, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" But Nathaniel was lacking "duplicity" - that is, his heart was undivided, his intentions pure - his openness to reality was always ready to recognize and surrender to the truth when he encountered it. He remained open to his friend Phillip's invitation to "Come and see" In encountering Jesus and hearing His words, he found himself face to face with the Truth Himself, and, like John the Baptist's leap in his mother's womb at the Lord's presence, Nathaniel's words leaped out of his own heart in a clear and simple confession of faith, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!" In Nathaniel we have an example of the pure man who sees recognizes - God when confronted with Him, and on seeing Him believes in Him, and upon believing in Him, follows Him. Nothing is known for sure about the life of Nathaniel/Bartholomew after the Ascension of Jesus, but tradition holds that he preached in the East and died a martyr's death in Armenia, being flayed alive for having won converts to the Lord Jesus. St. Bartholomew, pray for us.

HOW CAN I TALK TO OTHERS ABOUT JESUS?

Look for appropriate opportunities. People today do not want religion forced upon them or thrust in their faces. One sure way to grind conversations to a halt and to ensure that people walk away when they see us approaching is to begin talking about Jesus at every opportunity unilaterally. We can more effectively talk about Jesus if the topic of faith arises naturally or if we are asked to shed some light on where we stand on issues of faith or to explain what sustains us or where we find courage, strength, joy, or compassion.

Refer to stories from Scripture that relate to a current situation. In other words, rather than just going on and on about how much we love Jesus, we can say things like, "That reminds me of the story of the Prodigal Son," so that we are presenting Jesus within a context. It is common for people in conversation to make such references to TV shows or movies. Of course, this approach requires a familiarity with the Gospels so that we can effortlessly draw such references.

Mention inspirational books that contribute to a conversation or shed light on a specific situation or current event. For example, we might say, "I just came across a really good insight on that from a book I'm reading..." and then mention the book title and author as we share the insight. Likewise, we can make similar references to a good homily we recently heard or a seminar we attended. The key is to introduce a Christian response into a conversation that invites people to consider a new perspective.

Make references to prayer. In other words, we might talk about an insight or reassurance gained from an experience of prayer and, more importantly, assure others who are in need that we will pray for them. References to prayer are very important and effective because they introduce the notion of an ongoing, affective, living relationship with the Person of Jesus rather than a strictly intellectual and sterile familiarity with things Jesus said and did.

Stop talking and listen! This may seem counterintuitive since we are looking at ways to talk to others about Jesus. However, if we do all the talking, we will not be effective in our efforts to invite others to consider a relationship with Jesus. Think of how the Risen Christ himself, on the road to Emmaus with two distraught disciples, begins the encounter by asking them to share their experience: "What are you discussing together as you walk along?" (Luke 24:17) It is in listening to the two disciples that Jesus finds a way to invite them to see differently and to recognize his presence in their midst. And it is only after listening to them that Jesus shares what Scripture reveals about the "things that have happened." Talking about Jesus is much more effective if we have first listened to those with whom we hope to speak.

Talking to others about Jesus can be a challenge, and if we hope to do so effectively, we need to consider our approach carefully so that we come across as authentic and not as a caricature to be dismissed.



In return for this act of devotion, which usually includes Mass, Communion, confession and even an hour of Eucharistic Adoration on the eve of the first Friday of the month, our blessed Savior reputedly promised St. Margaret Mary the following blessings: "In the excess of the mercy of my Heart, I promise you that my all powerful love will grant to all those who will receive Communion on the First Fridays, for nine consecutive months, the grace of final repentance: they will not die in my displeasure, nor without receiving the sacraments; and my Heart will be their secure refuge in that last hour." Jesus wants us to rest on his heart, like St. John, and the First Friday devotion is an opportunity for us to encounter him more than just on Sundays and to deepen our love of him. Coming to know, love and trust that we may take rest in the Sacred Heart of Jesus, and place our anxieties within, is what the First Fridays are all about. So let us give due importance and consecrate ourselves this day of every month to the Sacred Heart of Jesus.
