



This Second week of Advent once again we focus on preparation. This is a great time to take a step back and consider how and why we prepare. Preparing to celebrate Christmas Day itself takes time. There's gift-buying, Christmas Card writing, cookiemaking, decorating, and the list goes on. While we prepare for family gath-

THOUGHTS ON EVANGELIZATION Readings: Is 11:1-10/Rom 15:4-9/Mt 3:1-12

Repent, the Kingdom of God is at hand...why did people in today's Gospel go out to see John the Baptist in the desert? Spiritually

- Give of your time and talents. If there's an organization that you've been meaning to help, it's likely that they could use extra hands around the holidays like in a Thrift Shop, Pregnancy center etc.
- Participate in your parish giving. Does your parish have an annual sock drive or a Christmas tree where you can out pick tags for gifts to give to a family in need, or something similar?
- You can also donate in a monetary way. You can spend less on gifts and put that money towards worthy causes in our parishes that you seem fit with a good conscience.
- Put away your smartphone and give your family members the gift of your time. Take part in things they are interested in doing.

This is a great time of year to focus more on others in need. Just as God gave us the greatest gift in sending His only son, we can make a gift of ourselves to serve others. The most important thing to do as you prepare is to focus on love. As you check things off your to-do list, you can contemplate the Christmas miracle and let it inspire you to love God and the people around you more.

THOUGHTS ON EVANGELIZATION Readings: Is 35:1-6a, 10/Jas 5:7-10/Mt 11:2-11

Today is Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete means "Rejoice!" We are rejoicing because the Lord is near. In today's gospel, we hear of John the Baptist's question. He is in prison, in darkness, and perhaps is wondering whether Jesus is truly the one. Jesus' answer is to look at the signs: He is making all things new: the blind see, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed. The poor have the good news proclaimed to them. In our day and age, there are times we may wonder. There is still so much darkness in our world. Can we, in the midst of this darkness, see the miracles of Christ's love around us? Can we, like John the Baptist, prepare the way for the Lord? Can we proclaim the good news of salvation to the poor? (from the Diocesan Office of Evangelization)

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...



For much of the Church's history, the Third Sunday of Advent is known as "Gaudete" Sunday. The traditions surrounding this Sunday go back as far as the fourth or fifth century, as does the season of Advent itself. Advent, our preparation for Christmas, was originally

a forty-day penitential season like Lent. In fact, since it used to begin on 12 November (just after the Memorial of St. Martin of Tours), it was called "St Martin's Lent." "Gaudete Sunday" was the Advent counterpart to "Laetare Sunday," which marks the mid-point in Lent. On Gaudete Sunday, the season of Advent shifts its focus. For the first two weeks of Advent, the focus can be summed up in the phrase, "The Lord is coming." But beginning with Gaudete Sunday, the summary might be, "The Lord is near." This shift is marked by a lighter mood and a heightened sense of joyous anticipation. Liturgically, the colors lighten as well. The word "Gaudete" is Latin for "Rejoice." This celebration is a reminder that God who loves us is still in charge and that we await His coming not with fear but with tremendous joy. We read in the Letter of St Paul to the Ephesians, which reflects this joy: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again, I will say, Rejoice. Let all men know your forbearance. The Lord is at hand. Have no anxiety about anything but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which passes all understanding, will keep your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.'

REMINDERS:


...Willsboro has reached the goal for Bishop's Fund this year. On behalf of the Bishop, I thank you all who have made the generous contribution.

5 WAYS TO FIND PEACE & JOY THIS ADVENT 1. Make a morning offering.

Find time for at least 10 minutes of adoration, Scripture reading, solitude and listening to God. Begin your day in God, with His Word in your mind and in your heart.

2. Make short acts of adoration, thanksgiving, and praise throughout the day.

Call to mind the first Christmas when false expectations and meaningless busyness try to steal away your moments. If we can go to Mass and adoration all the better, but if we can't, we can spiritually unite ourselves and receive spiritual communions throughout the day by offering up prayers of desire and praise.

3. Go to confession.

God's Mercy, grace and strength is amazing and through this Sacrament you can get rid of all the unnecessary burdens of sins and make room for Christ's peace to dwell in our hearts.

4. Ask Mary and Joseph for help...

...to know and love the Father's will, and His Son, Jesus, as they did. Recognizing God in His hiddenness -- in our family members and in our trials – while keeping and treasuring all these things in our hearts.

5. Be happy!

A spiritual director once told that the greatest gift we can give our children is for the family to be happy despite the burdens and challenges. Ask the Holy Spirit's help to choose to enjoy, love, and treasure those God has given you to love, in each moment He has given you to live! We can do this by being mindful of the great and unfathomable love of Jesus and all the gifts we had been given.

HOW IMPORTANT IS IT TO SAY. "MAKE ME AN INSTRUMENT... ...OF YOUR PEACE?"


There is a tendency in human nature and especially in our society today to make everything selfish, to focus inward on the all-important "me," while overlooking the way our behavior and attitudes affect those around us. It is so easy to forget that focusing on others is an important way of focusing on God, and some of our best opportunities to serve God well are found in serving our neighbor well. This beautiful prayer by St. Francis of Assisi perfectly articulates a truly Catholic spirit of love—to serve, not to

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace. Where there is hatred, let me sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; and where there is sadness, joy. O Divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. Amen.

We have a responsibility to take our effect on others seriously, and not to abuse our power to hurt but help another person. Because one response prompts another, even the smallest of actions can have a huge effect. We've all experienced having a day made or ruined because of one simple interaction with another person, having one quick word or gesture change everything. Our lives are full of opportunities to make a difference in someone else's lifewhether positive or negative, and rather than simply avoiding harm, our goal should be to actively choose love and be a true "instrument of God's peace."

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...



Christmas is often marketed in fluffy and tinseling ways – in pastel colors, lots of emphasis on here today and gone tomorrow presents, chocolate and bubbly, friendly faces, and so forth. The domestic reality, of course, is more mixed than that.

It is certainly about showing children love, celebrations, and families coming together. But it is about real families and relationships. Christmas has its fair share of tensions, tantrums, jealousies, and unspoken harsh words, as well as of love, generosity, and affection. It needs rich and deep colors to describe it, not just soft blues, yellows, and pinks. It poses serious questions to us about what matters to us in our lives. When we think of the story of the first Christmas, that element of seriousness is appropriate. The question underlying the Gospel stories of Christ's birth asks where we might look to find God in our world. The answer given in the stories is that we might expect to find God in unnoticed people, in marginal and poor places, in simple human realities like giving human birth, in danger from paranoid rulers, in flight from home, in intimations of a troubled future. The stories address the deep realities of human life and not just the surface. The Christmas stories also say that where God is found, joy can also be found. As at the first Christmas, joy is built with the bricks of unselfish love, the straw of unexpected growth in times of solitude, the mortar of conversations that happened because there was nothing more interesting to do, and the sharp eye that notices and responds to the joys and sorrows of others. Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

What is this sign that the angel in St. Luke's Gospel proclaims? God is born among us. What a wondrous sign of God's love for you and me! St. John of the Cross once wrote to a friend: "Think nothing else but that God ordains all, and where there is no love, put love, and you will draw out love."



When God the Father didn't find love in the human race, He put love in the human race through the Incarnation of His Son. Then, He found Love, in His Son Jesus and in all who had become a part of His Body. Each of us is called to go and do likewise. When we don't find love in a situation, we can put love there and then we'll find it! We can make a difference.

A current example can be found in the tens of thousands of Polish families opening their living rooms to Ukrainians fleeing their homeland. Polish monasteries, convents, rectories and homes are among some of the places where Ukrainian refugees are encountering the living Lord in their neighbors.

We must embrace the same kind of faith in the overriding providence of God in all the events of our lives—even in a world that, at times, seems so loveless, so Godless. The angel insists: Do not be afraid, I've got some great news to share with you. God has been born among us and, through His Spirit, He remains ever present.
