THOUGHTS ON EVANGELIZATION Readings: Wis 9:13-18b/Phlm 9-10, 12-17/Lk 14:25-33

To be a disciple requires that we pick up our cross and follow Christ. Sometimes we do not know what that means, so we go looking for crosses that we think will be good enough. But the crosses come as part of our daily lives and we pick them up by the way we respond to the situations as Christ would have us respond. Look at Onesimus in the second reading today. A runaway slave whose name means "useful." After his baptism, he is sent back to his owner. This could not have been easy. But neither would it be easy for his owner to now treat him as a brother in Christ. How do we respond to the situations in our own lives? 

It can also be redemptive. By enduring the hardship of work in union with Jesus, the carpenter of Nazareth and the one crucified on Calvary, man collaborates in a certain fashion with the Son of God in his redemptive work. He shows himself to be a disciple of Christ by carrying the cross, daily, in the work he is called to accomplish. Work can be a means of sanctification and a way of animating earthly realities with the Spirit of Christ. In work, the person exercises and fulfills in part the potential inscribed in his nature. 

## NATIONAL DAY OF REMEMBRANCE FOR ABORTED CHILDREN, September 10, 2022

It has been said that you are truly forgotten after the last time someone speaks your name aloud. It's a sad fact of life, one nobody really likes to think about. In fact, being forgotten ranks high on the list of some of the greatest fears we face as human beings. That's why it's so important to keep alive the memories of our loved ones—to share stories, to pass along wisdom, to tell future generations of the ones who have gone before us, and to honor their memories. But what about those who never even had a name to remember? What about those who were forgotten or discarded before they had a chance to breathe air? This is the cruel reality of abortion. And so, it is up to us as pro-life people to not only give these deceased children names but to keep their memories alive, to tell others about them, and to share their stories in the hopes that the brutality of their deaths will help others understand the evil of abortion. This is the goal of the National Day of Remembrance for Aborted Children. Established in September 2013 and occurring every September since, this special yet solemn day reminds people that these tiny children were on this Earth for just a short time. It reminds people that these babies mattered. And it reminds people that we will never forget these innocent little ones. The day of remembrance began on the 25th anniversary of the burial of 1,500 abortion victims in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, as a joint project of Citizens for a Pro-Life Society, Priests for Life, and the Pro-Life Action League. In conjunction with this burial service, over 100 memorial services were held in other states across the nation. The idea was then born that this event should occur annually. Please note that we have a monument for them in Willsboro cemetery. Please feel free to stop by and pay your respects and prayers at your convenience.

Exaltation of the Holy Cross (Feast: Sep. 14<sup>th</sup>) traces its beginning to Jerusalem and the dedication of the church built on the site of Mount Calvary in 335. But the meaning of the cross is deeper than any city, any celebration, any build-

ing. The cross is a sign of suffering, a sign of human cruelty at its worst. But by Christ's love shown in the Paschal Mystery, it has become the sign of triumph and victory, the sign of God, who is love itself. Believers have always looked to the cross in times of suffering. The cross does not explain pain and misery. It does not give us any easy answers. But it does help us to see our lives united with Christ's. We often make the Sign of the Cross over ourselves. We make it before prayer to help fix our minds and hearts on God. We make it after prayer, hoping to stay close to God. In trials and temptations, the cross is a sign of strength and protection. The cross is the sign of the fullness of life that is ours. At Baptism, too, the Sign of the Cross is used; the priest, parents, and godparents make the sign on the forehead of the child. A sign made on the forehead is a sign of belonging. When we make Sign of the Cross, we remember that we bring our whole selves to God our minds, souls, bodies, wills, thoughts, heartseverything we are and will become. O Cross, you are the glorious sign of our victory. God Bless us.



#### CARRYING OUR DAILY CROSSES...

How many times have we felt like the weight of our cross is too heavy for us to bear? How many times have we fallen and felt as though we could never get up again? It's not easy to carry our crosses. Many times, we feel tired. Sometimes, we don't even know how long we can still go on. We see others succeed as though they don't have any burden to bear. People praise them and look up to them. ## FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...



St. Matthew (Sept. 21<sup>st</sup>) was a wealthy and "important" man in his day and age. As a tax collector, he was also disliked by many of the Jews. But he showed himself to be a good man by His immediate response to Jesus' call. We do not have many details to this story, but we

have the details that matter. We see that Matthew is at work collecting taxes. We see that Jesus simply walks by him and calls him. And we see that Matthew immediately gets up, abandons everything, and follows Jesus. This is quite a conversion. For most people, this sort of immediate response would not happen. Most people would have to first get to know Jesus, be convinced by Him, talk to their family and friends, think, ponder and then decide if following Jesus was a good idea. Most people go through a long rationalizing of God's will before responding to it. Is that us? Every day God is calling us. Every day He calls us to serve Him radically and completely in one way or another. And every day we have an opportunity to respond just as Matthew did. The key is to have two essential qualities. First, we must recognize the voice of Jesus clearly and unmistakably. We must, in faith, know what He says to us when He says it. Secondly, we must be certain that whatever Jesus calls or inspires us to do is worth it. If we can perfect these two qualities we will be in a position to imitate the quick and total response of St. Matthew, pray for us.

## FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...



Archangels (Sept. 29<sup>th</sup>) are the second order of angels just above the guardian angels. In all, there are nine orders of celestial beings traditionally organized into three spheres. The entire hierarchy is traditionally organized this way:

Highest Sphere: Seraphim, Cherubim and Thrones. Middle Sphere: Dominions, Virtues and Powers. Lower Sphere: Principalities, Archangels and Angels (Guardian Angels). The hierarchy of these celestial beings is ordered in accord with their function and purpose. The highest of the beings, the Seraphim, were created solely for the purpose of surrounding the Throne of God in perpetual worship and adoration. The lowest of the beings, the Guardian Angels, were created for the purpose of caring for humans and communicating God's messages. The Archangels were created for the purpose of bringing messages of great importance to us and to accomplish tasks of the highest importance in our lives. Michael is well known as the archangel who was empowered by God to cast Lucifer out of Heaven. Lucifer is traditionally thought to be of the highest sphere of celestial beings and, thus, being cast out by a lowly archangel was quite a humiliation. Gabriel is well known for being the archangel who brought the message of the Incarnation to the Blessed Virgin Mary. And Raphael, whose name means "God heals" is referred to in the Old Testament Book of Tobit and is said to have been sent to bring healing to Tobit's eyes. Though not much is known of these archangels, it's important to pray to them because we believe God has entrusted them with a mission to help us bring healing, fight evil and proclaim the Word of God. May the Holy Angels protect us.


