THOUGHTS ON EVENGELIZATION

Readings: Jb 7:1-4, 6-7/1 Cor 9:16-19, 22-23/Mk 1:29-39

I was struck by the sense of mission in the readings today and the contrast between the slave whose service is drudgery in the first reading and Peter's mother in the Gospel. If you have ever been ill, you know how tired and weak it leaves you, even after the illness leaves you. But Jesus heals completely. He restores Simon Peter's mother to complete health. She then joyfully serves them. She has a mission; her life has meaning. She finds her joy in taking care of her family and guest. Jesus can heal and transform our infirmities too, whether they are physical or spiritual. We, too, have a mission. We are called to follow, to become holy as he is holy. If we allow Jesus to grasp us by the hand, we shall be transformed, and find our joy in following Jesus and telling others about our

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



The 11th-century Japanese courtesan, Sei Shonagon, once said, in what is considered the world's oldest novel, that a saint is one "who has really given up all thoughts of the world". In a sense, she is right. Her compatriot, **Paul Miki**, who was martyred in Nagasaki in 1597, and the **other twenty-five martyrs of Japan**

whom we honor on 6th would have had to renounce the world, and focused instead on Christ, and "the life of the world to come". So, yes, the saint looks beyond this world and their present life. But, in another sense, the saint cannot be one who has really given up all thoughts of this world but care for the salvation of the world. As St Thérèse of Lisieux, who is patron saint of the missions, famously said "love was the true motive force which enabled the other members of the Church to act; if it ceased to function the apostles would forget to preach the gospel, the martyrs would refuse to shed their blood. As St Paul Miki said moments before his execution: "Having arrived at this moment of my existence, I believe that none of you thinks I want to hide the truth. That is why I declare to you that there is no other way of salvation than the one followed by Christians". So, the martyr sheds his blood in order to witness to the most important things in life, truths worth dying for, and his witness is an act of love for others, hoping that we might thus be convinced of the Faith for which he died – faith in the Crucified Christ, in the power of his resurrection, in the truth and necessity of his Word. St Paul Miki's dying words were: "I hope my blood will fall on my fellow men as a fruitful rain". Such was his love for us that motivated his sacrifice. As we contemplate his witness today, let us do so with humility and open hearts, open to the Truth he loved and preached. Through his intercession, may we be roused to greater faith and hope in Christ and his promises that we too may end our journey of faith well.

THOUGHTS ON EVENGELIZATION Readings: Lv 13:1-2. 44-46/1 Cor 10:31—11:1/Mk 1:40-45

Are you amazed at the courage of the leper in today's Gospel? Lepers were excluded from the community, they were to "dwell apart", as the first reading tells us. Yet this leper dared to approach Jesus. People must have been shocked at his approach and even more shocked at the fact that Jesus touched him. What about us? Are we afraid to approach Jesus with our deformities, with our sins? For it is not leprosy that separates us from the body of Christ, but rather our sins. Can we approach Jesus through the priest in the Sacrament of Reconciliation and say with the leper "if you wish, you can make clean." The season of Lent begins this coming Wednesday with Ash Wednesday. Let us turn to the Lord and allow him to make us clean by taking away our sins that we too may rejoice and sing his praises.



I recently came across the story of a little girl who went to Ash Wednesday service with her family and was confused as she listened to the words spoken during the distribution of ashes: remember you are dust and unto dust vou shall return, so after the service she asked her mother what it meant. So, her mom decided dust you shall return. to tell her the creation story of how God formed mankind out of the dust

of the earth and how God then blew into his nostrils the breath of life and how this dust had now become a human being. She then tries to tell her daughter what the prayer actually means, that one day everyone will die and return to the dust from which they were created but that one day God will raise us up from the dead and we will become glorified as he is glorified and become even better than we are today, but for that to happen we have to turn away from sin and live good lives. The little girl seemed okay with that answer until the next morning when she awoke from her sleep and screamed for her mom: Come quickly - I think someone's under my bed. Her mother looked under the bed and said that's nothing but dust. "I know" she said, but after you told me we were created from dust and will return to dust and after seeing all that dust I was sure someone had to be either coming or going. Hopefully we're not as confused as that little girl - but know that those of us who repent of our sins and live good lives - will one day be united with our Lord in the kingdom. When you and I become "marked" for Jesus - we are going to be his witnesses - and people everywhere are going to know where we have been when they see ashes on our forehead - Have the courage to wear this badge of honor throughout the day so other people will know that - a great fast in the church - has begun. Wear this cross as a proud follower of Jesus - just as he was willing to wear his cross for us - when he became nailed to it. Wishing you all a Blessed Lenten Season.

From Bishop Terry R. LaValley...

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

Soon after learning that I was to be the next Bishop of Ogdensburg, I discovered that I needed to select an Episcopal motto, a brief phrase that would express the theme of my



future ministry as a bishop. I was inspired to select two simple words of invitation by Jesus to his disciples: Follow Me. These words continually challenge me to be a faithful disciple of Jesus in my journey of faith in this life, in good times and bad. They motivate me in my ministry as your bishop to offer the best possible guidance in

all our earthly journeys of discipleship.

Lent 2024 calls each of us to follow the poor, humiliated and rejected Jesus. We recommit ourselves to grow ever closer to Him, particularly at this moment in history when such a commitment encounters so many challenges. Are we willing to follow Jesus even through the real struggles we face in trying to be faithful today? Can we overcome the weariness, frustration and confusion that wells up within us because the way of following Jesus has clearly become the Way of the Cross?

This Lent can be a pivotal juncture in our faith journeys. First and foremost, we must grow closer to Jesus and discover the hope and confidence that such a relationship brings. We ask ourselves what concrete steps am I willing to take this Lent to strengthen our relationship with Jesus? Does my prayer life need to be tweaked? Am I committed to participating even more attentively at Eucharist? Will I celebrate the Sacrament of Penance more regularly, spend time in Eucharistic Adoration, read Scripture; and assist in my parish's outreach to the needy,

These Spiritual Exercises are among many others that help us tend to our relationship with our Lord. With ongoing growth in my prayer life and nourishment by the Sacraments, I can confidently participate in the mission of Christ, knowing Jesus is always by my side. Let us seek the intercession of Mary, Our Lady of Hope and Mother of the Eucharist, in our Lenten efforts to draw closer to Jesus and His Body, the Church.

LENTEN RULES FOR FASTING & ABSTINENCE

Everyone 14 years of age or older is bound to ABSTAIN from meat on Ash Wednesday, all the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday.

- Everyone 18 or older, and under 59 years of age, is bound to **FAST** on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.
- On Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, only one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals. sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted. When health or ability to work is seriously affected, the law does not oblige.
- Catholics should not lightly excuse themselves from these prescribed minimal penitential practices.

Today's Gospel from Mark is very short and seems to speak about a time of transition. Jesus spends 40 days in the wilderness, where he is tempted, but also, where he is ministered to by the angels. He then enters that other wilderness of society to proclaim the good news: that the kingdom of God is at hand and call humanity to repentance. We have entered a 40-day journey of Lent. It is a time of preparation for the coming kingdom: a time of repentance, reconciliation and letting go of those things that keep us from a right relationship with Jesus. Let us spend time in prayer, fasting and almsgiving, that we will come to know better the way of the Lord as we journey toward the celebration of Easter.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



The Feast of the "Chair" of St. Peter liturgically recalls the day he took up his episcopal ministry in Antioch, where he served before coming to Rome. He was Pope from Jesus' ascension (May 19, 30

AD), but he didn't immediately go to Rome. The early Christians not only celebrated Peter's heroic martyrdom as a feast but also celebrated the day in which he started to guide the first Christians in the place Jesus' believers were first called Christians. To celebrate the feast of St. Peter's Chair on 22nd, however, is something more specific than honoring Peter's ministry as a whole. The chair was the ancient symbol of teaching authority. Teachers would sit and all their students would stand, the exact opposite of what happens today. In the Gospel, the evangelists tell us on several occasions that Jesus "sat down and began to teach" the crowds. The chair became a symbol of teaching authority and in some ways that remains today, when we refer to the person who has the "chair of philosophy" or "chair of theology" or even the "chair" of a particular meeting. To celebrate the feast of the Chair of St. Peter is to rejoice in the teaching authority Christ has given him for the sake of his body the Church. Jesus gave Peter the "keys of the kingdom of heaven," to bind and loose on earth, and that even greater authority over the sacraments points to the authority he has to teach authoritatively in Jesus' name. We retain the expression of the Pope's teaching ex cathedra (literally "from the chair") to highlight his most solemn teachings to us, applying Christ's words and wisdom to the present age. On this Feast, the whole Church needs to focus on what this Feast means and give God thanks for the gift of papal infallibility when teaching definitively on matters of faith and morals. To be truly Catholic, we need to hold fast to Peter's confession of faith through his successors in continuity. And we need to give thanks for how the Holy Spirit hovers over the chair and how the saints support the Petrine teaching authority. With Love and Prayers.... Fr. J.T.

"First Friday" of the month First Friday is often marked by a special devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus since Jesus died for us Sacred Heart of Jesus and won our salvation on a Friday. Every Friday of the year, and not only the Fridays in

Lent, is a special day of penance as stipulated in the Code of Canon Law: "The penitential days and times in the universal Church are every Friday of the whole year and the season of Lent" (Canon 1250). Jesus made the following 12 promises to St. Margaret Mary in favor of those who consecrate to the Sacred Heart, in a spirit of reparation, the **First Friday of each month**. 1. I will give them all the graces necessary in their state of life. 2. I will establish peace in their homes. 3. I will comfort them in all their afflictions. 4. I will be their secure refuge during life, and above all, in death. 5. I will bestow abundant blessings upon all their undertakings. 6. Sinners will find in My Heart the source and infinite ocean of mercy. 7. Lukewarm souls shall become fervent. 8. Fervent souls shall quickly mount to high perfection. 9. I will bless every place in which an image of My Heart is exposed and honored. 10. I will give to priests the gift of touching the most hardened hearts. 11. Those who shall promote this devotion shall have their names written in My Heart. 12. I promise you in the excessive mercy of My Heart that My all-powerful love will grant to all those who receive Holy Communion on the First Fridays in nine consecutive months the grace of final perseverance; they shall not die in My disgrace, nor without receiving their sacraments. My divine Heart shall be their safe refuge in this last moment. The Church grants Plenary indulgence (explained under reminder) to those who attend Mass and receive Communion in honor of The Sacred Heart of Jesus on the First Friday of each month for nine (9) consecutive months. In our journey of faith, may we have a special devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

It covers all sins, mortal or venial, that the recipient has committed up to that time, if the person sincerely repents, detests their sins, and fulfills all requirements such as going to confession, receiving the Holy Communion, and praying for the intentions of the Holy Father.

THE HOLY ROSARY

In a world where the frenetic pace of modern life seems never to slow down, it's easy to get lost amidst the whirlwind of responsibilities, worries, and commitments that surround us. Amidst this seemingly endless chaos, finding moments of peace and tranquility becomes a constant quest for many of us. It is in this context that spiritual practices play a crucial role, offering refuge for the weary soul amidst the storm of everyday life. One such practice, deeply rooted in the Catholic tradition and enriched by the wisdom of venerable figures like St. Padre Pio, is to place the rosary under the pillow during sleep. At first glance it may seem like a simple, even trivial gesture, but it is precisely in this simplicity that its depth and meaning lie. In the vast spiritual panorama, there are simple practices that hold deep and transcendental significance. One of them is the ancient tradition of placing the rosary under the pillow during sleep. I would like to share with you a few compelling reasons to adopt this sacred practice in our daily lives. Firstly, the rosary under the pillow serves as a spiritual anchor amidst life storms. In the silent hours of the night, when thoughts seemed to dance around our minds like leaves in the wind, the tangible presence of the Rosary reminds us of the promise of divine protection. It's as if each bead of the Rosary were a link of security, connecting us to God's love and mercy, even in the darkest moments. (To be continued...)
